To the people of God at Our Redeemer,

In recent times, the idea of vocation, especially that of police and soldiers has been a major topic of discussion. There is an age-old question? Can a soldier be a faithful child of God? In 1526, Martin Luther wrote a brilliant piece entitled, "Whether Soldiers, Too, Can Be Saved." In Luther's day, the soldiers functioned as both the army and police. It is not a new question. There are those in our society who are asked to do things which the Word of God says "Thou shalt not do." On the battlefield, a soldier can be commanded to kill and destroy property. If someone other than a soldier would kill or destroy property, they would be thrown into jail. Yet, the work of the soldiers is seen as being done under the governing authority that Scripture says God has established. A soldier can fight, even kill, and still be a faithful child of God.

The role of police is much more difficult to define. The police are given the mandate "To Protect and to Serve." This involves guarding the innocent and the most vulnerable. This mandate also can require violence similar to what is expected of a soldier.

As I have no personal experience with the vocation of soldier or policeman, it is a challenge to understand in my mind their sense of vocational duties. One of our good friends from Mellen, WI has a daughter who is a rookie police officer. A few months ago she was attacked by an unarmed man. She chose not to shoot him. He wrestled with her and shot her with her own gun. Thankfully, there were some civilians who came to her aid and her wound was not life threatening. She is continuing in her chosen vocation.

While living in Pana, I had another friend named Sean who was part of a deep undercover narcotics team in Baltimore, MD who retired early after killing the head of a drug cartel in a fire-fight which claimed the life of his partner. Sean's family room had shelves lined with marksmanship awards and trophies. All of them were first place trophies. I asked him about them. He simply said, "I never miss." Sean didn't retire because he ended someone else's life. He was comfortable with that being part of his vocation – he spent months at a time in Iraq as part of a sniper team embedded with the military. However, the reason he retired from police duty, what he couldn't live with, was that in the fire-fight with the drug cartel, he had the opportunity to end the fight with one more shot, but he missed. He killed the last guy with another shot, but in the meantime, that man killed Sean's partner.

I can't imagine being in a life and death situation like that, or being a soldier on a battlefield, or entering a burning building with a firehose. There are vocations which a select few are chosen to do which allows the rest of us to live out our vocations in life as workers, as students, as a father, mother, son, daughter, as a child of God. Whatever is your chosen vocation, do it to the glory of God and for the good of your neighbor.

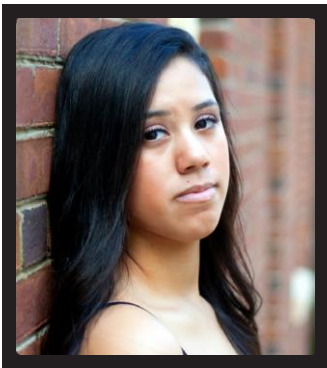

The teen years can be confusing for both children and parents. While young children accept and identify with their parents, adolescents embark on a search for their own identity. They may begin to question and rebel against previously accepted rules and values. They are also going through physical changes and a surge in hormones. These physical, emotional and cognitive changes can play havoc with a teen's sense of well-being.

Parents may feel at a loss as their child changes from compliant and loving to moody and rebellious. It is particularly frightening for parents if the teenager engages in risky behaviors.

How do parents differentiate between a teen experiencing normal mood swings and a depressed teen? Depression is more than feeling sad once in a while. Signs of depression in teens include sadness or crying, hopelessness, increased irritability or anger, inability to concentrate, school absences or a drop in grades. Other signs include physical complaints such as stomachaches or headaches, fatigue or eating or sleeping too much or too little. In addition, a depressed teen may have feelings of hopelessness or guilt, social isolation, boredom or loss of interest in previously-enjoyed activities or low self-esteem.



In more serious cases, you may see alcohol or drug use, self-mutilation (cutting, burning, biting) or thoughts of suicide.*

If your teen is experiencing any of these symptoms for two weeks or more, make an appointment with your doctor. Some illnesses have symptoms similar to depression. If other causes are ruled out, your doctor will recommend individual and/or family counseling and may prescribe an antidepressant.

While depression is a serious illness, don't overreact to the anger and irritability that is common in teen depression. Remember (even when your teen can't) that you and he are partners in fighting the illness, not each other.

** If your teen is having thoughts of suicide, call your local hospital's emergency room immediately.*

You and your family do not have to struggle alone. LCFS counselors help families generate hope and cope with life's challenges.
