ORLC St. James School Tuition Endowment Fund

The current \$5,000.00 match challenge has been met and surpassed by \$1,135.00. This takes us up another level in our work to develop an endowment that will provide future tuition assistance to St. James School for members of our congregation.

A committee started the research on creating this fund on 1-31-16 and had meetings throughout that year. We presented our recommendation to the Voters and it was approved with the adoption of the Endowment Fund By-Laws on 9-25-16.

Late December 2016, we started collecting funds with a \$10,000.00 matching challenge. We also voted to have the LCMS Foundation invest and manage the fund for us.

As of 11-30-20 we have a balance of \$231,733.00 with the LCMS Foundation and \$5,094.00 on deposit at $1^{\rm st}$ Bankers Trust giving us a total of \$236,827.00 as of December of 2020.

As we look forward to fundraising in the future, there are two sources of monies that we ask you to keep in mind. One, we would ask each of you to consider including the St. James School Tuition Fund in your will. Secondly, consider the Endowment Fund when making a decision about memorials for a loved one.

Of course, we will always accept matching funds challenges! Since we started the Endowment Fund, we have had four major matching challenges: one for \$10,000, two for \$5,000 and one for \$20,000. All have been met. Checks should be made to **ORLC St. James School Tuition Endowment Fund.**

Starting on Thursday, January 14, at 3:00 pm

The book *The Unholy Trinity: Martin Luther against the Idol of Me, Myself, and I* by Michael Lockwood (CPH, 2016) lays out Luther's multi-faceted case against idolatry and for the one saving God. This book applies the reformer's biblical insights to our times today.

CID Evangelism Executive Ken Schurb will conduct one-hour Zoom discussions of this book every other week, with a break in February.

These conversations are open to all members of CID churches. Pastors and other rostered church workers are especially encouraged to participate. - 1. Not incorporating the theme and verse in the essay will disqualify the entry.
- 2. Examples of topics the essay could deal with are, but not limited to: abortion, the handicapped, adoption or foster care, infanticide, cloning, stem cell research, physician assisted suicide or euthanasia etc.
- 3. Essays should include student's name, grade (Identify school or church) and email address. All entries submitted by a teacher or pastor, should include their name and email address. This information should be submitted on the rubric page used in grading the essay. Teachers are encouraged to consult the rubric (see Gretchen) and submit qualified entries.
- 4. All sources for references, statistics and quotes should be incorporated within the essay and then included in a bibliography at the end. Grades 6 8 should submit essays up to 400 words Grades 9 12 should submit essays up to 750 words.
- 5. Entries should be submitted digitally using Microsoft Word or Google Docs to by April 1, 2021 to cathy.benning.os@gmail.com
- 6. There will be a \$100 first place award & a \$50 second place award for each of the two. The two first place category winners will advance to the national contest. Email the address above with questions.
- 7. Grand Prize for the national winning entry at each level: \$250 plus free conference registration to a 2021 Regional Conference and one night stay at the conference hotel.

CID News You Can Use:

We may have been hoping that the COVID-19 pandemic would be over by now. But many of us are still experiencing its affects. Even if we aren't sick, we may be feeling COVID FATIGUE, which may include weariness, loneliness, frustration, fear, anger, and grief.

Yet, in Christ we can still have hope, joy, and peace. Martha Washington was quoted as saying, "The greater part of our happiness or misery depends on our disposition and not on our circumstances." We do not always have the power to change our circumstances. But we do have the power to change our attitude or outlook. We can adjust our disposition by doing the following:

Remember that just as God has gotten us through difficulties in the past, He can do so again. He has provided and will continue to provide the resources and support we need.

Believe that eventually, according to his timing, God will change our circumstances. We are told that a number of COVID vaccines will soon be available. We can trust that eventually this pandemic will end.

Think positive. Norman Vincent Peale wrote "Change your thoughts and you change your world." St. Paul wrote in Philippians 4:8 "Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable - if anything is excellent or praiseworthy - think about these things."

Trust that God works through all situations for the good of those who love him and are called according to his purposes (Romans 8:28). He gives us peace that passes understanding, hope that doesn't fail us, and strength in Christ. God may be working through our difficulties to help us grow, to rearrange our priorities, or to fashion us for better things.

Trust that God is with us always. David said to his son Solomon in 1 Chronicles 28:20, "Do not be afraid and do not be dismayed, for the Lord God, even my God, is with you. He will not leave you or forsake you." Jesus said in John 10:10, "I have come that they may have life and have it to the full." He gives us a full life of hope, joy, peace, strength, and contentment even when the world seems to be trying to take these blessings away. The Fullness of Time: Sometimes an event bulks so large that it seems hard to take in. People ask themselves, "What just happened?" Not only can they mull over the event, but also the time when it came. Think of the class of 2020, saying "I was about to graduate, then COVID-19 struck!"

In a Bible passage to be read in our church service this Sunday, St. Paul wrote by inspiration that "when the fulness of time had come, God sent forth his Son." We just celebrated Christmas. When Jesus first came, Paul, noted, it was in the FULNESS OF TIME. How so? We do not know the answer to this question from the perspective of God Himself. Still, we can piece together a few points from what we do know.

Jesus was born during the "Pax Romana," the Roman peace. The Romans built great roads, some of which remain in use today. Missionaries like St. Paul could travel roads as well as any in the world for centuries, until modern times. Rome brought a unified jurisdiction to much of the world. St. Paul, who was a

Roman citizen, did not meet with our red tape associated with getting visas, passports, and permits. People could understand him when he spoke and wrote. Common Greek was pretty much a world-language, used in literature, in commerce, also in everyday speech. This was when Jesus was born, and when Christianity broke forth in the world. Fulness of time, all right, and no accident!

What happened in that fulness of time? "God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons" (Galatians 4:4-5).

Now, this is a fulness of time for you!
