To the people of God at Our Redeemer,

The year of our Lord 2025 marks the 500th anniversary of some very dark days in history, especially concerning what was happening in Germany in and around Martin Luther. The year 1525 marked the beginning of the Anabaptist (rebaptism) movement and the Peasant's War. Both movements were a rejection of the Roman Church and sought to reject Rome by rejecting anything that hinted of Roman doctrine. However, the two movements approached fighting against Rome in very different ways.

The Anabaptists were generally pacifists. The most famous Anabaptist is Menno Simons, the father of the Mennonite church. Supporters of this movement would claim that the heart of Anabaptist theology is that infant baptism was not valid and you must be rebaptized as an adult so that you can make your own personal choice and confession, because they reject that baptism actually washes away your sin. They believe that it is only an initiation ritual to bring a person into the church. The real heart of Anabaptist theology is a rejection of anything that hints of the Roman Church. Therefore they rejected infant baptism, denied the real presence of Christ in the Sacrament, did not use stained glass or similar religious art, refused the clergy to wear robes during worship, etc.

Simply from a logic argument, the rejection of infant baptism and the real presence of Christ in the Sacrament makes no sense. One would have to believe that all of the disciples misunderstood what Jesus had taught them in regard to "baptizing all nations" and "this is My body . . . this is My blood." The disciples of Jesus then would have had to gone out into the world and establish churches which would conduct these wrong practices without anyone debating any point to the contrary. Then, after 1500 years of allowing the church to wallow in ignorance, God, by His grace, finally opened the eyes of some men from Switzerland and Austria to finally know what Christ truly desired for His church. This makes absolutely no sense.

You need to understand that the Anabaptist movement was born at a time of rebellion, not theological study. The Anabaptist rebellion was mostly peaceful. The Peasant's War began in 1524 with an uprising by peasants encouraged and led by Rev. Thomas Muentzer was not peaceful. Muentzer was a radical pastor who was seeking to end the last of the obligations of the peasants to the feudal landowners. Much of feudalism had gone away in Germany by this time with the rise of the trade guilds, but the peasant farmers were still forced to pay a heavy tax to the landowners and to the Roman Church. As the Reformation took hold in Germany, the peasants did not take kindly to an additional 10% of their earnings still being sent off to Rome.

Muentzer took advantage of the growing civil unrest and started a war that led to the death of at least 100,000 peasants. Many more died in the aftermath due to a lack of food being grown. The year of our Lord 1525 was a very hard year for Germany and anyone connected to Martin Luther. However, it is important to remember that the difficult environment of false teaching and war which dominated 1525 ultimately led to the presentation of the Augsburg Confession in 1530, which we celebrate each year on June 25. Like the Nicene Creed and the Athanasian Creed, that statement of faith was born out of very difficult circumstances.

This is a good reminder that God often uses difficult days or years as a crucible to refine both people and ideas. No matter what year it is, it is the year of our Lord!
