

“Don’t Believe the Lies. Walk in the Truth.”

Matthew 5:21-37

These past two weeks, we have been focusing on our need to avoid the lie and seek the truth. Our world is filled with lies that sound plausible. Satan is the father of lies, and he doesn’t come at you with horns showing, breathing fire. He is much more crafty than that.

One subtle, but very dangerous lie, is that Jesus’ words in the Sermon on the Mount (and God’s Word in general) sends to you the message: “Do this! Obey! Then will you be right with God.” And playing a part in our own salvation is very appealing to our Old Adam.

But for those of us who know that we are saved by God’s grace alone, through faith, apart from works, can quote Ephesians 2:8-9 by heart – I even have it printed on the back of my business cards – Satan has a sweet little lie for us also.

We hear God’s Word of Law that if you are angry with your brother, you are a murderer and are liable to judgment. Have you ever been angry with your brother? Then you deserve judgment. You deserve death and the hell of fire. You do.

Satan’s sweet little lie is that God’s Word of Law is really no big deal for us. I am baptized. I have the Gospel. It doesn’t matter if I get angry. I am covered. It doesn’t matter if I look at a woman lustfully or look at pornography. The lie is that it doesn’t even matter if you act upon those

desires and pretend that you are married to someone to whom you are not married. The lie is that God's Law has been abolished by the Gospel.

We heard Jesus say last week that He has not come to abolish the Law, but to fulfill it. He has kept it for you. But do not think that God's will for your life doesn't matter – as if you were given this “get out of hell free” card at your Baptism.

If you are angry with your brother, you deserve death and the hell of fire. If you say “You fool!” you will be liable to the hell of fire. This one hits particularly close to home for me. The Greek word for fool is “mwros” from which we get the word “moron.” My use of the word “moron” has greatly diminished since the football season has ended, as it seems that teams for which I cheer are populated by “morons.” That was a running joke in our home this fall, as the girls picked up on my repeated frustration I expressed through the phrase, “You moron.”

I am a sinner who deserves the hell of fire for all eternity. I am not saying this to be funny. That is what I deserve. That is why being saved by grace, through faith, apart from works, it is a gift from God, is the truth that brings me true comfort and joy.

Now, Jesus calls the scribes and Pharisees “morons” “fools” later in Matthew's Gospel. He expresses righteous anger at how they have abused their place in the Kingdom of God. My anger and frustration tends to be not so righteous which is why I deserve the hell of fire for saying the same word.

The world stands condemned already, as Jesus says in John 3:18 – you know, just a couple verses after John 3:16. We are liable to judgment. We would all stand before the judgment if it were not for the Son of God fulfilling God's Law. Jesus came not to abolish the Law, not to get rid of it,

but to fulfill it, because you or I could not keep the fullness of God's Law. We are sinners who deserve the hell of fire.

This is the balancing act with the truth of the Gospel in the middle and Satan's lies on either side. For those who are gung-ho for the Gospel, Satan says, "Did you hear what Jesus said, 'Obey all these rules and you have no fear of judgment.'" He knows we will try. He knows we will fail. He knows that we will get frustrated. He knows we will get angry. He knows the Dallas Cowboys will draft more "morons" this year. We cannot obey this word of Law. It would be easier for me to tear out my eye and throw it away, or cut off my hand and throw it away, so that I would stop sinning with my hands and my eyes. If only keeping God's Law were that easy. Satan wants you to look at Jesus' words and despair.

On the other side of truth, Satan says, "Aren't you baptized and forgiven. Don't worry about all these words of Jesus. That is just for those "bad people" out there. And he turns the Gospel into a pillow that your sinful mind can sleep on in comfort. As I said last week, you cannot be comfortable in your sin and comforted by the Gospel at the same time. If you see violence and it doesn't make you uncomfortable; if you hear the name of God profaned and it doesn't make you uncomfortable; if you see people who are not married pretending to be married and it doesn't make you uncomfortable; then there is something wrong.

In between Satan's lies is the truth – the Gospel of Jesus Christ, Eph. 2, salvation by grace through faith, a gift from God, apart from works, but responded to by our works which God prepared beforehand for us to do. As Jesus said earlier in the Sermon on the Mount, "Let your light shine before

men that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven” – not for the praise of you; not so you can get to heaven; but for His glory.

The message of Christ in the Sermon on the Mount is not “Do this! Obey!; and it is not “Don’t worry, be happy.” Rather, Jesus says, “I bless you: ‘Blessed are the poor in spirit, (those who are empty of themselves; who know they have nothing to offer God) for theirs is the kingdom of God.’ You are the salt of the earth; you are the light of the world; you are mine: And your Heavenly Father would pay any price for you – even the cost of the life of His own Son. And I have prepared good things for you, but your life on earth will most likely be even more difficult because they will hate you because they hated Me first.

Adam believed Satan’s lies. You and I have believed Satan’s lies. Sin is our rejection of what God has designed our life to be.

His Law is a demonstration of His will for you and your neighbor. It expresses all of the good that He wants for you and for your neighbor. He wants you to be free from anger; free from sorrow; free from sin (as the hymn writer says). Do not look at what Jesus says and despair because you can’t keep yourself free from anger; free from sorrow; free from sin.

And on the other side of the lie, if you get rid of the Law, you will lose your awareness of sin, and eventually you will lose your awareness of the need to get rid of that sin. So you will get rid of the Gospel too. That is the whole point of His sermon. You and I still deserve the hell of fire. You can’t fix this on your own. He says, “I came to keep this Law for you.”

You are saved by grace alone, through faith, it is a gift from God, not by works. Don’t believe the lies. Walk in the truth. Amen.
